

Anti-slavery policy statement – PROTAPE LTD

Protape Limited has a zero-tolerance approach to slavery and is committed to preventing acts of slavery and human trafficking from occurring within both its business and supply chain, and imposes those same high standards on its contractors, suppliers and other business partners.

Company structure

Protape Ltd is a supplier of blank recording media to both the professional broadcast industry and the consumer UK market.

Protape Limited procure goods and services in excess of £6 million per year. We work with a range of different suppliers and establish a relationship of trust and integrity with all our suppliers, which is built on mutually beneficial factors. Our supplier selection includes due diligence of the supplier's reputation, respect for the law, compliance with health, safety and environmental standard, and references.

Due diligence processes

We have:

- Made our staff aware of the Modern Slavery Act, including its definitions of slavery and human trafficking;
- Told staff what to do if they suspect a case of slavery or human trafficking;
- Contacted suppliers and partners in potentially higher risk categories to check what assurance arrangements they have in place;
- Reviewed our Whistleblowing Policy.

The above procedures are designed to:

- Identify and assess potential risk areas in our business and supply chains.
- Reduce the risk of slavery and human trafficking occurring in our business and supply chains.
- Monitor potential risk areas in our business and supply chains.
- Provide adequate protection for whistle blowers.

We have not been made aware of any allegations of human trafficking/slavery activities against any of our suppliers, but if we were, then we would act immediately against the supplier and report it to the authorities.

This statement is made pursuant to section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes our Group's slavery and human trafficking statement for the financial year ending 30/09/2017.
